The first workshop will address hearing technology (hearing aids: what they can do for you and what not to expect), assistive devices including inductive looping. Attendees will get a chance to try out a few things and ask questions.

The second workshop will deal with medical/surgical issues related to hearing loss, i.e., tinnitus, Meniere's disease, other medically-based adult onset deafness, and implantable devices—cochlear and Baha.

Charitable Giving by Will

This article is the third in our series describing the variety of legal devices that individuals can use for making donations to help charities of their choice. In this article we focus on wills as they can be used for charitable gifting.

A will is a “testamentary instrument,” meaning that it is a legal document that becomes effective upon the death of the person making the will, called a “testator.”

An allocation in the will of some portion of the testator’s assets at the time of death, including cash, real and personal property and other assets, can be made to a charity. This allocation can be a bequest consisting of a specific asset or dollar amount, or it can be a percentage of the individual’s entire estate. The will could also provide that the testamentary gift to charity be made out of the remainder of the estate left after specific bequests have been paid.

A will is generally prepared by a lawyer who is familiar with all the formal legal requirements for effectiveness, as well as the options for best carrying out the testator’s wishes. The signing, or execution, of the will must be witnessed by two individuals, unless it is a holographic will — one written in the handwriting of the testator. Wills can be amended or replaced by an entirely new will at any time before death.

After death, a will is effectuated through the probate process, in which a court oversees the gathering of assets, the paying of debts, and final distribution of the estate. It is important to note that portions of the estate that are left to charity can reduce estate taxes and/or income taxes.

Trouble with Amplified Telephones Going on the Fritz!

The old Ma Bell phones were built like a Sherman tank, of all what is known as passive components—no transistors or ICs. Not so with today’s feature-laden phones — loaded with electronics, far more prone to failure.

For most phones, repair is not economically feasible — we stopped doing phone repairs at the shop maybe 20 years ago.

On the more expensive amplified phones, however, repair “might” be worth considering. The general run of thumb in the electronic service industry is when the repair cost approaches 50% of a new product, it’s better to replace than fix.
